Setting the Stage



National PTA is the oldest and largest child advocacy association.

Structure

- 54 State PTAs (includes Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, DC, Europe)
- 8,000 Council PTAs (Regional/District)
- 24,000 Local PTAs (School Affiliated)
- 3 million paid members; 14 million students
- 55% of PTAs are affiliated with Title I schools

Roles

- Advocate for federal, state, and/or local improvements to education
- Partner with schools to engage families
- Distribute information and keep families in the loop
- Provide resources to support schools




- As schools reopen, families share **positive ratings** of their school environment and communications.
- However, there is room for improvement.

81% of families say schools allow parents/families inside the building


Describes How Your School Interacts with Families

However, there is room for improvement.

Less than 3 in 10 families see schools doing an "excellent" job, and even less so in middle and high school



Of families who speak another language at home say the school provides interpretation & translation



Of families who have a disability say the school provides accommodations

One area where schools can improve is communicating effectively to support student success.

4 out of 10 parents agree...

- The teachers at my child's school could do a better job giving parents/families honest feedback about their children.
- My child's school relies too much on technology like apps, texting and mass emails to communicate with parents and families


77% of families say it would be extremely or very helpful if schools provided families with multiple measures on how their child is doing academically





There are simple fixes and big bets to improve effective communication for student success.

Parent Teacher Conferences



21% of families report that teachers/staff receive training on how to communicate with families, but...

70% would find this extremely/very helpful





Strengthening how schools collaborate with families is key so they can speak up for their child and every child.

Less than 50% of parents are very confident they know who to ask or how to find information they are looking for.



Of families find it difficult to share their thoughts with administrators.

Top priorities for more info:

- How your child's school spends its budget
- How add'l funding for COVID needs was being used at your child's school
- How your child was doing in their social and emotional wellbeing
