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WHO WE ARE

The National League of Cities (NLC) is the voice of America's cities, towns and villages, representing more than **200 million people** across the country. \$65 billion available in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) to local governments.

Allocation Deadline: 12/31/2024 Spending Deadline: 12/31/2026

One allowable use of SLFRF funds: "respond to the far-reaching public health and negative economic impacts of the pandemic."

This includes mitigating the impacts of the pandemic on children, youth, and families, and the community-based organizations that serve them.

Meeting the Moment: Cities Increase Investments in Young People to Support Pandemic Recovery and Beyond


New survey results from the National League of Cities (NLC) find that mayors, city councilmembers, and other municipal leaders across the country overwhelmingly believe that afterschool and summer learning programs are important strategies to utilize as the nation continues on a path to pandemic recovery. Respondents say they are more likely to invest in these programs now than ever before.

Key Findings



 The number of cities funding afterschool and summer learning programs in the pandemic recovery period has surpassed pre-pandemic levels.
More cities anticipate funding afterschool and summer learning programs post-pandemic




Survey Question: "During each time period, did your municipality provide funding for afterschool and/or summer learning programs (including funds the city received through the state and federal grants)?


Key Finding #3



A significant number of cities increased their investment in afterschool and summer learning programs during pandemic recovery (2021) and plan on continued growth


Cities expanded afterschool and summer learning partnerships with youth-serving community organizations throughout the pandemic recovery period.

Key Findings #6



There is growing sentiment among city leaders that afterschool and summer programs are "Extremely Important"



Survey Question: "During [x] time period, how important are afterschool and summer learning programs for the children and families in your community?



City leaders need additional resources and tools to fully tap the transformative potential of afterschool and summer learning programs

The top three needs respondents identified to help them better provide critical programming for children and youth were:

- Stronger partnerships with schools (43%)
- Outreach and communication tools to increase diversity of program participants (40%)
 - More funding (39%)

New NLC Research

NLC tracked 80 cities making 410 distinct investments in young people using ARPA funds as of March 2022.

The data demonstrates how cities are utilizing their ARPA funds to help youth recover from the educational, social, and emotional impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic




NLC CITY SUMMIT 2022

Cities cumulatively invested over \$2 billion in ARPA funds to support young people's learning, growth, and recovery.

Dollars Spent on Youth



Larger cities invested heavily in young people, between \$60 million and over \$500 million.

Excludes New York City (\$552M), Washington D.C. (\$492M), and Chicago (\$135M)


NLC's analysis grouped cities' investments into 8 categories:

- Parks and Recreational Infrastructure
- Afterschool and Summer Learning Programs
- Workforce Development Programs and Postsecondary Student Support
- Youth Services
- Youth Employment Programs
- Library Programs and Infrastructure
- Programs in K-12 Schools/Districts
- Youth Reengagement Programs

Total Investments by Category

Cities collectively invested \$1.1 billion in afterschool and summer learning programs, more than 2x any other collective investment in the sample

Cities put an average of 60.86% of their total ARPA investments in youth toward afterschool and summer learning programs



State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund Investments -City Examples



Cities Creating/Investing In City-Led Programs

 Washington, D.C. – \$2 million for expansion of city-run Boost Camps and creation of Summer Plus camps, both of which provide lowcost academic assistance and recreational activities to DC youth



 Sacramento, CA - \$1.3 million to expand Youth PopUps program, which hosts weekend events for youth in under-resourced areas and provides access to educational lessons, recreational activities, and information on city services (including the Covid-19 vaccine and mental health resources)

Cities Investing in Community Based Organizations

• Kalamazoo, MI - the city partnered with United Way to distribute \$550,000 in grants to non-profits that provide youth services, including summer programs

•Moscow, ID - provided \$375,000 in grants for non-profit organizations that provide community or social services, including specifically those that offer afterschool programs

• Memphis, TN – up \$9 million in ARPA funds for Boys and Girls Clubs across the city

Cities Partnering With School Districts

- Bridgeport, CT Partnered with Bridgeport Public Schools (BPS) to invest \$6 million annually (\$2 million from BPS and \$4 million from city) into youth programs. They jointly selected 6+ community-based organizations to receive grants, including:
 - The Village Initiative Project college prep program
 - Bridgeport Caribe Youth Leaders youth development organization
 - Triangle Community Center LGBTQ+ community center
 - Greater Bridgeport Symphony music program provider





NLC CITY SUMMIT 2022

Cities Expanding Afterschool Infrastructure



- Richmond, VA investing \$65.5 million into 4 community centers and the acquisition of land for a new park
- South Lake Tahoe, CA following a participatory budgeting process, South Lake Tahoe is investing \$250,000 to revitalize the local skate park


